2. Plans

You've probably heard the old adage "failing to plan is planning to fail". Naturally, we don't want anyone to be failing. Therefore, we're giving you some guidance for **planning**.

Take a few moments to think about how you will approach this project. Consider how much time you have before the deadline. What parts of the project should be done first? **Make a plan** for how you will approach this project (discuss with your partner, if you're working with a partner). Include a plan for what you will be doing **each day** until the assignment is due. Since you're handing this in on Monday, it's okay if part of your plan describes what you did over the weekend. You may find that later you'll need to **modify** this plan; that's perfectly fine. The point is to be thinking ahead **now**, and be organized about how you will spend your time. Here is the beginnings of an example plan for someone working with a partner (but you should make a plan even if you're working alone):

- 1. **Saturday:** We selected our partners and determined what would be good times during the week that we could both be in the lab to work together.
- 2. **Sunday:** We talked about the design of our solution to the project. We decided that we should break the program into three files: one for file operations, one for encryption, and one for decryption.
- 3. **Monday:** We will start on the file input and output class. We'll write one method for input and one for output, and include a main() method in the class so we can test our input and output methods.
